and also that if development should take place on the lower 8 acres that no floor elevations be below 50 ft. because of the risk of flooding; and also that, on the upper 2 acres, if an increase is granted in the number of units allowed under the current zoning and restrictions, that significant and long term benefits commensurate with the increase in density be required from the owner for the people of Newton; and that energy conservation measures and solar heat, particularly passive, be considered in construction.

<u>Solar Tour</u>: Virginia Taplin reported that the tour was a great success with 150 paid tickets, and good coverage from the Newton Graphic. John Bliss is drafting a thank you letter to the homeowners who participated. It was agreed that the letter should include mention that the tour ticket price covered our expenses. It was agreed, too, to invite the 150 ticket purchasers to join the Conservators.

There was discussion of the Human Services Committee of the Board of Aldermen's interview of Peter Damon before he was approved as a <u>new Conservation</u>

<u>Commissioner</u>. Rodney Barker asked excellent questions, according to those reporting on the meeting. It is hoped that a Conservator may be the next appointee.

**Staniford Street hearing**: Sally Barnett and A.M. Abernathy reported on the public hearing of October 13.

<u>Autumn Walks</u>: The October 4 walk led by Laurie Borden, for children with parents, was poorly attended. It conflicted with the Harvest Fair, among other things. The Oct. 18 walk led by Debbie Howard - and publicized by a newspaper photo with caption indicating it had occurred before publication - was attended by between 30 and 40 people. Margaret Thompson will lead a walk on October 25, 1:30 p.m. on the geology of the Webster Conservation area, west side.

<u>Library display</u>: The display, put up by Fran Hintsa, using photographs by Paul Mann, Betsy Fuchs, and Octo Barnett, has been up for two weeks.

**Photo contest**: has been postponed until someone will come forward who has time to organize it.

**Norumbega Park**: Helen Heyn will be clearing trails in the park on the coming four Saturdays, between 9:30 and 12:00 noon, and would be glad for some help.

<u>Large Parcels</u>: These will be the subject of the November meeting. Board members were urged to visit them in preparation, exercising due caution to avoid golf balls. Bart Hague suggested that the possible valuations and restrictions should be investigated before final property assessments are made, and that we encourage the Conservation Commission to be in touch with the assessors on this issue.

<u>Geology booklets</u>: It was agreed to add a page updating information (e.g., where copies may be obtained, location that used to be Stearns Parking lot now Bloomingdale's clothing store, etc.). MOTION: To continue to sell the booklets for \$.50, and to give them away as part of special events -- e.g., geology tours. ACTION: APPROVED.

<u>Membership meeting</u>: Sally Barnett, Jean Thompson, Arnold Meltzer, and Fran Hintsa had met with Anne Hayden, who has volunteered to help us. She is professionally interested in helping organizations define their goals and achieve them. Should we decide that we wish to expand membership, she would be willing to help with a membership drive. The need to get to know our existing membership better, both to retain the

members and to identify potential new board members, was noted. Ted Tedesco suggested that the annual meeting might be better utilized. For example, one might have a picnic and especially invite new members, of whom we currently have 75. It was agreed to invite Anne Hayden to a meeting when we are ready to discuss program -- sometime after the coming two meetings, which are already full.

**<u>By-Laws</u>**: John Bliss suggested there is need of updating. It was agreed that the current version will be sent to the board in preparation for discussion at a later meeting.
