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**Winding Down the Cochituate Aqueduct**

**Location:** Coldspring Park, Newton MA (1993)

**Client:** New Art Center, Newton, MA (with funding from the National Endowment for the Arts)

**Materials:** Artifacts and information based on historical records of water and the development of Boston

**Size** approx. 1/4-mile trail

**Budget:** \$3000

**Description:** This trail through the Coldspring Park leads over the old Cochituate Aqueduct, which once delivered over 18,000,000 gallons of water to the city of Boston. The Aqueduct saw the development of the flushing toilet, the Industrial Revolution, and the Great Fire of Boston. The cost and the quality of the water were as much present a hundred years ago as they are today. Facts and artifacts from the Aqueduct and its history were displayed along the trail for park visitors to discover as they walked. The experience offered visitors a new and deeper understanding of the Aqueduct.
