Message from the President

On Saturday, June 27 - a sunny and hot day amidst weeks of rain and drizzle - two families moved into their new Habitat for Humanity homes at 76 Webster park, a beautiful spot right on the edge of Dolan Pond. During the dedication ceremony I listened to a beautiful Bach violin prelude, the words of the assembled speakers, and a singing catbird and came to understand not only how much effort it took on the part of literally thousands of volunteers to make the vision real, but the wonderful spirit in which this work was done. Made possible initially by the acquisition of the property through Community Preservation Act funds, the project accomplishes exactly what CPA was intended to do - it protects a beautiful parcel of open space, creates affordable housing and even preserves a historic building.



Once the land was acquired, literally thousands of people gave of themselves to make this vision a reality. The spirit in which this work was done is a great treasure in our City. This spirit reflects our community's desire to be good and thoughtful stewards of some of what is so precious here in Newton - the remaining woods and open spaces, peaceful enough for birds and mammals to nest and for people to refresh themselves with quiet walks, Newton's diversity, and its historic tradition.

Other projects like this are on the horizon. As Conservators we will continue to do all we can to continue to initiate and support these efforts. We also look to you, our members and supporters, for ideas, help and support along the way.

Another Invasives Pull at Cold Spring Park!

Hello to the wonderful invasives busters - if you are not yet completely exhausted, there is going to be one last effort to take out the Garlic Mustard at Cold Spring park aqueduct walk before the seeds disperse. Join Bill Joplin and Katherine Howard at Cold Spring Park (Duncklee Road entrance) on Sunday July 12 - from 10 am to 1 pm or so or however long people want to work. If you could join the effort, it would be great, and very much appreciated! The cool rainy weather perhaps has extended the time available to get the

garlic mustard - so that is a good thing. Eric Olson has made some fascinating experiments/observations showing the amazing viability of the garlic mustard seeds - and indicating that not composting, but rather incinerating, the waste really is very important. Thanks to all those who have worked so hard at the invasive removal sessions this season. Unfortunately, we'll be doing it again next year!!

Historic Newton Walks: Newton Corner and the Jackson Legacy

Beginning with Edward Jackson's purchase of 500 acres of land in 1646, the Jackson family played a leading role in the development of Newton Corner. His descendants lived at several locations in the village as farmers and active community residents. William Jackson in particular changed the face of Newton Corner in the 1840s when he successfully brought the passenger rail line through Newton, creating a new market for suburban land development. A Farm summer program for Middle School students (going into grades 6 through 9)

At Newton Community Farm and Nahanton Community Gardens Spend a week outdoors with your peers and staff from Newton Community Farm, learning to plant, maintain, and harvest a farm garden. Discover how food is produced, and enjoy camaraderie with your fellow gardeners, farm staff and volunteers. Students will work at the farm, maintain garden plots at Nahanton Park, and grow food for the Newton Food Pantry. Students may sign up for one or

more weekly sessions. Each session will include gardening, community lunches (bring your own, and share a dish made from fresh farm produce), and a different theme related to social justice and/or sustainable agriculture. Scouting for the Asian Longhorned Beetle
Hunnewell Building, Arnold Arboretum, 125 Arborway, Jamaica Plain, MA 02130

The Asian Longhorned beetle (*Anoplophora glabripennis* (Motschulsky), "ALB") hitchhiked to the United States in the solid wood packing material of shipping crates and pallets used to import goods from Asia. After a concerned citizen reported seeing this invasive pest in Worcester, MA in August 2008, a large infestation was discovered, resulting in a 64 square mile quarantine zone. The ALB grows and reproduces within healthy and stressed deciduous hardwood tree species, such as maple, birch, horse chestnut, poplar, willow, elm, and ash, eventually killing the host tree. Adults can be seen on infested trees from summer through frost, but are most visible in the Northeast from late July through August. Learn to scout for this devastating pest with ALB specialists Jennifer Forman-Orth, ALB Outreach Coordinator, Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources, and Nichole Campbell, Pest Survey Specialist, US Department of Agriculture. The event will take place at the Hunnewell Building, Arnold Arboretum, 125 Arborway, Jamaica Plain, MA 02130. The session is FREE, but advanced registration is appreciated. Build a Bluebird House
Newton Community Farm Educational Series

Help bring back bluebirds to the farm! The bluebird is very beneficial to us, eating large quantities of insects, such as cutworms and grasshoppers, considered damaging to our crops and gardens. These beautiful birds were once very common in the United States. However, over the last century their numbers have diminished due to loss of natural habitat, overuse of pesticides and predators. Tom Libby, Newton Community Farm's assistant farmer, will lead adult-child pairs to constructing birdhouses. The bluebirds will nest and raise their families in the houses returning to the farm for years to come. Your first creation will be installed at the Farm. You will go home with directions and all the materials needed to make a second bluebird house for your own yard! Instructor: Tom Libby. CRWA Invasive Water Chestnut Removal Volunteer Project

Charles River Watershed Association (CRWA) and Charles River Canoe and Kayak, in collaboration with MA Department of Conservation and Recreation, are partnering to remove the invasive aquatic plant, water chestnut, from the Newton and Waltham area of the Charles River. The program is now in its 3rd summer. Join in this effort yourself, or with friends and family. Join in the last of four public events during the chestnut pulling season, which everyone is welcome to attend (RSVP required) on Sunday, July 19th - 10 am to 2 pm. CRWA also welcomes corporate, neighborhood, scout troops and other groups of 15-60 volunteers at any time during the month of July; contact us to find a time for your group to help out. There will be a short training session before volunteers are sent out onto the river to pull the chestnuts. Any volunteer who completes the training session can come back to Charles River Canoe & Kayak to pull chestnuts again at any time through August 9, free of charge. Water chestnut, an invasive aquatic plant, grows very densely, and can choke the water in shallow sections of the river and along the shoreline, severely limiting light (a critical element of aquatic ecosystems), decreasing oxygen in the water, and preventing boat passage. In order to prevent water chestnut from spreading, the plants need to be removed before they drop their spiky seeds into the river, which happens in early August.

Mass Highway and Mass DCR will hold a public hearing to provide the public the opportunity to become fully acquainted with the proposed reconstruction of Nonantum Road (Project # 605662). The proposed project will reconstruct Nonantum Road to provide one 11 foot

through lane in each direction and other improvements.

Historic Newton Walks: Historic Angino Farm

Come explore old Angino Farm, an historic landscape and working farm now called Newton Community Farm. Learn about its 300-year history as a small working farm and the Angino family, Italian immigrants who lived there for over 80 years. Visit the experimental orchard, beehives, restored barn, farm stand, and teaching garden full of summer vegetables.
