# A few events ....

hope that you have been having a great summer - it certainly has been a hot one! The Newton Conservators are Newton's own open space and land trust organization and we encourage you to get out and about in Newton and nearby environs! Below is an interim calendar of a few upcoming events (especially one tomorrow at Echo Bridge) with more details coming in an upcoming newsletter.

### **Events**

Saturday, August 20, 9am -11 am Black Swallow-wort Removal Session Hemlock Gorge (Ellis Street)

Tomorrow, **Saturday Aug 20, 9-11 am**, Newton Conservators will hold a Black Swallow-wort (BSW) removal session at Hemlock Gorge, specifically at the base of Echo Bridge on Ellis Street, where a small flat field (site of the former Superintendent's House) has been completely taken over by BSW, an invasive new to Newton that is also fatal to Monarch Butterflies along their migration route. Please join us!

This year, the field is in much better shape than last year: wonderfully, DCR mowed down the BSW just before it flowere, and did it again a couple weeks ago to ensure the regrowth did not reach flowering stage. We are thrilled to have this support from DCR! The wonderful rep Erica Aubin wants to



help and team up with volunteer groups like ours. Please become part of this group!

Now, only the perimeter needs hand-pulling, where shrubs and trees prevented mowing, and a couple hours of work should do it. This is important work to leverage the DCR mowing, show DCR we have consistent volunteer support, and stop the spread of BSW to the rest of Hemlock Gorge and Quinobequin.

This year we will also have the help of several high school Envirothon team members, who continue to be eager to put their knowledge into hands-on practice and to continue their learning in the great outdoors. We are very happy to have their help! Dress for potential poison ivy--gloves, long pants and sleeves, closed shoes. We will have extra gloves and also the poison-ivy wash available.

For those not familiar with Black Swallow-wort, this is a good opportunity to learn about it. It is invading Newton. Very soon the BSW seed pods will release their fluffy air-borne seeds and the spread will continue. If you find it in your yard, carefully bag seed pods and dispose as trash. #### September 1 - November 11 Saturday, September 10, 1 - 5 pm (Show Opening) Kennard Park Sculpture Trail

The Kennard Park is a Newton City owned open space. The Friends of Kennard Park in collaboration with the Newton Parks and Recreation, presently residing in the Kennard Park estate; are happy to be hosting The Kennard Park Sculptor Trail; September 1, 2016 through October, 2016. Along with the eight-week exhibit, there will be an exhibit opening where all of the artists will be and a presentation of the work will begin. In addition there will be scheduled workshops and talks by some of the artists offered to the public. There will also be speakers presenting on related topics to the park—to be announced.

The Kennard Park Sculptor Trail, an eight-week art exhibit, was initiated by FKP. Carolyn's wonderful friend and mentor, Allison Newsome; is an internationally known sculptor and curator of a number national and internationally known art exhibits relating to historical/public sights. Similar to the Allandale Farm Artist's Installation that Allison initiated; it is our hope to inspire the public's appreciation of how nature and art serve all of us in profound ways. How we, the public, can continue to enjoy the purity that nature offers—inner peace, relaxation, and rejuvenation of ourselves! We in turn may we ask ourselves "how might I give back to this space?" Whether it be by purchasing the artist's work or donating to the Friends of Kennard Park, non-profit; these offerings will make a difference to the Kennard Park for all to enjoy for generations to come!

#### The Sculpture Trail at Kennard Park Historic Newton

In the early 2 th century, Kennard Park was a gentleman's estate designed and planted with fruit trees and shrubs to attract a variety of birds. The park and conservation land are now owned by the City of Newton. This fall, Friends of Kennard Park have created the outdoor Kennard Park Sculpture Trail. Join curator Allison Newsome, an internationally known sculptor, for a walk along this trail to see how artists used the landscape and its history to create site-specific work. #### Sunday, September 18, 2 pm A Stroll through 300 Years in Chestnut Hill Historic Newton

Originally settled by a few farmers in the 1650s, Chestnut Hill retains buildings and structures from each phase of its history. Starting at the 1868 Chestnut Hill Chapel, John Wyman, chair of the Chestnut Hill Historic District Commission since its establishment in 1992, leads a walk down Suffolk Road. Observe one of the oldest houses in Newton (built around 1700), as well as the late 19th and early 20th century architect-designed houses and gardens that followed the introduction of commuter rail service to Chestnut Hill. Wyman will describe how the establishment of the Chestnut Hill Historic District in 1992 has encouraged the preservation of historic structures. The tour ends at Mrs. Hammond's 10-acre English style garden and Houghton Garden, now owned by the City of Newton. Meet at the Chestnut Hill School parking lot, 428 Hammond Street. The details of the start of the cleanup have been complicated by the reconstruction of the Elliot Street Bridge. Please check the website (<u>hemlockgorge.org</u>) in early October. (There's a lot going in Hemlock Gorge. The Friends are applying for funds for a new fence at the circular dam, treating the



hemlocks for hemlock wooley adelgids and hemlock scale, and working with the MWRA to fix the railings on top of Echo Bridge. More details in subsequent communications.

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
