Down By the River - New Takes on Charles River History

After years of researching and exploring the Charles River, presenter Kathleen Rowe has assembled a visual journey along this famous river as it winds through cities and towns in the watershed. In her free talk on Tuesday, June 4 at 7 p.m. at the Durant-Kenrick House and Grounds, she points out historic sites and events that have taken place along the river, while also describing some of the initiatives that have brought the Charles to its world-class status as an exemplary urban waterway. Enjoy scenic views and a few stories about the river today. Free admission. This event is supported by



the Wellesley Bank Charitable Foundation and is part of the "Crossing Borders" series, a collaboration between Historic Newton, the Natick Historical Society, the Needham History Center & Museum, and the Wellesley Historical Society. It is free and open to the public.

Do you aspire to create landscapes with genuine ecological value for a wide array of avian species— from songbirds, to raptors, owls, woodpeckers, and more? Claudia will lead an in-depth exploration of the principles and practices for achieving this objective, based on understanding the essential habitat requirements for bird survival. Our examination starts with the importance of native plants. Then we will take a deeper look at the value of different canopy layers, preferred planting strategies, techniques for providing water, and the critical role of active ecological systems to avian survival. We finish by considering our human interactions with birds. What are the pros and

cons of feeding birds directly through seed and suet? Do nest boxes really help our native songbirds to breed? And given the threats from both human activity and non-native bird species, how can we tilt the balance in favor of our native songbirds? Claudia Thompson founded Grow Native Massachusetts in 2010. She is nationally recognized as a leader in the native plant movement, and was featured as one of the "Wild Ones" in Garden Design magazine along with Doug Tallamy, Darrel Morrison, and others. Claudia's happiest moments are spent in her own garden where she has recorded 80 species of birds using the habitat she and her husband have created on their small urban parcel in Cambridge. Regular CPC Meeting on June 11th (7 pm, City Hall Room 204) In addition to program planning and committee business, this agenda includes discussion of a pre-proposal from the Riverside Greenway Working Group for \$50,000 in design funding for Charles River trails between Riverside and Auburndale. NOTE: The CPC does not base funding votes on pre-proposals but uses these discussions to advise project sponsors and determine whether or when it will consider a full proposal for each project.

The Webster and Cohen Conservation areas and the DCR Reservation form a large wooded expanse that stretches from the shopping malls of Route 9 almost to Newton Centre. The woods extend on both sides of Hammond Pond Parkway and both sides of the MBTA Riverside tracks and are home to 20 kinds of ferns and related plants. We will visit the southeast corner near Hammond Pond and see about a dozen or more kinds of ferns. Wear long pants to protect against poison ivy and bugs. If you have a hand lens, bring it. Bring any native fern you would like me to identify. Park and meet near the woods behnd The Street Shopping Center (near Davio's Restaurant), between the pond and


