We will look at how the trees and their care have evolved over the years. We also will discuss ways to ensure these trees remain assets to the community.


Join the Newton Cultural Alliance and our collaborative partners for the first West Newton Festival Weekend, June 23-25! to celebrate arts, culture, and

Take a short and architecturally interesting three block route from the Allen Center to the nature rich Dolan Pond Conservation Area, featuring accessible trails, a boardwalk and four vernal ponds, which is home to nesting wood ducks, mallards, herons, woodpeckers, vireos, orioles, owls, turtles, frogs, toads, muskrats, fox, and lots more. We'll look for ducklings,



listen for birds, and visit the newly planted pollinator gardens. Discover West Newton's hidden gem for yourself!

Saturday, June 25, 2 pm & 4 pm Wellington Park Butterfly Mini Garden Tour

Take a short 5-minute walk from the Allen Center to the delightful two-acre Wellington Park, dating back to 1932, featuring amenities for all ages - beautiful gardens, open fields, walking path with benches, play structure, basketball and tennis courts, a Little Library, and more. We'll visit the Butterfly Gardens and Monarch Waystation there to see many native pollinator plants including three types of milkweed, on which we'll look for Monarch eggs and tiny striped caterpillars as well as other pollinators.

Nibbling on Native Plants in your Backyard and Beyond Russ Cohen - Expert Forager Presented on Wednesday, April 6, 2022 https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=4igw6fi6okY

A webinar with Russ Cohen, expert forager and author of Wild Plants I have Known... and Eaten, features at least two dozen species of native edible wild plants suitable for adding to your own landscape, or nibbling on as you encounter them in other locales. Keys to the identification of each species are provided, along with edible portions, seasons of availability and preparation methods, and guidelines for safe and environmentally



responsible foraging. Since his retirement as the Rivers Advocate for the Mass. Dept. of Fish and Game's Division of Ecological Restoration, Russ has more time to pursue his avocation, which is connecting to nature via his taste buds — and assisting others in doing the same. He has set up a small nursery in Weston where he grows over 1,000 plants that he propagates from seed.

<u>Jumping Worms in Field and Forest</u>

Dr. Annise Dobson, Yale School of the Environment Newton Conservators Spring Webinar Series - 2022 Presented on Wednesday, April 20, 2022 https://youtu.be/m4gBYXtEUJY

Nearly all earthworms in New England are introduced from Europe and Asia. While some species of earthworms benefit some species of plants, invasive earthworms have caused major shifts in North American plant communities. Jumping worms alter the structure and chemistry of the soil dramatically, leaving a grainy soil full of worm excrement (castings), and they can damage lawns, landscapes and forest habitat. This talk will presented the impacts and



history of earthworms (and jumping worms in particular) and provided information on identification of jumping worms. It was presented by Dr. Annise Dobson, a postdoctoral researcher at the Yale School of the Environment. Currently, she is working to identify the movement of jumping worms through NewYork City and assessing their impacts on urban plant communities. <u>Sustainable Landscape Designs: Nature's Best Hope</u> Virtual Lecture

Professor Doug Tallamy, University of Delaware Presented on Thursday, May 26, 2022

Recent headlines about global insect declines and three billion fewer birds in North America are a bleak reality check and a wakeup call for homeowners to create landscapes that enhance local ecosystems rather than degrade them. Learn how native plant communities that sustain food webs, sequester carbon, maintain diverse native



bee communities and manage our watersheds, can empower everyone to play a significant role in the future of the natural world. Doug Tallamy is the T. A. Baker Professor of Agriculture in the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware, where he has authored 106 research publications and has taught insect related courses for 41 years. He is the author of several books, including his most recent, The Nature of Oaks. In 2021 he co-founded Homegrown National Park with Michelle Alfandari, a 20 million acre network of viable habitats that will provide vital corridors connecting the few natural areas that remain. This program was part of the Green Newton series and was cosponsored by Newton Free Library, Green Newton, Newton Conservators, and Newton Tree Conservancy.

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Reinventing Hammond Pond Parkway

The reconfiguration of Hammond Pond Parkway between Beacon Street and Route 9 is now closer to becoming reality having recently been approved by The City of Newton Conservation Commission. The Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) owns the parkway, and therefore is responsible for the design, permitting, and construction of the project.

Turning the Parkway into a Destination

Few pedestrians and bicyclists currently use the parkway because it is unfriendly, uninviting, and somewhat changerous with no space designated for pedestrians or bikers and two narrow lanes of automobile traffic in each direction. Pedestrians trying to cross Hammond Pond Parkway face a daunting task crossing four lanes of traffic moving fast, particularly

during peak traffic hours. In contrast, the woods on either side of the roadway are quite popular with walkers and joggers from all parts of the city and beyond. The trails

provide inviting spaces to enjoy nature and exercise away from vehicular traffic. A goal of this redesign is to welcome pedestrian and bike traffic to the parkway and integrate it more with the adjoining public open spaces as the parkway becomes safer and more inviting.

Peter Reed of Build, Support, and Protect Group (BSC) asked attendees at a public meeting in January 2021 to "imagine what this [will] be. We [will] turn this into a destination." DCR's Dan Driscoll said that it's their aim to create a "family friendly facility" that is also environmentally sensitive.

The Project

This roughly onemile stretch of road will become significantly more environmentally an

pedestrian / biker friendly as the roadway is reduced from four lanes to two and a shared use 12-foot-wide pedestrian / bike pathway is added to the west side (closer to Newton
